University of Indianapolis Healthcare Spring Term Trip 2019

The University of Indianapolis (UIndy) School of Nursing's annual Spring Term Healthcare Trip to Ecuador was successful again this year! The team consisted of 30 members: doctors, nurse practitioners, translators, faculty, students, and missionaries. Over the course of six days, our medical team provided care for approximately 730 patients! Of these patients, approximately 250 were yearly examinations for Compassion Kids. In addition to providing care, the team joined a local kids bible club. The team played games, had fun with bubbles and colored a craft.

To begin the preparations, students researched climate, religion, education, politics, dress and healthcare practices of the country. To gain a better understanding of what to expect in the clinic setting, skill stations were set up. Stations included vital signs, health history, pharmacy, and ear washing. Students verbalized these activities helped prepare them for the spring term trip. While on the trip, missionaries stated the students were prepared and the clinic flow was smooth and seamless.

Common diagnoses included musculoskeletal pain, GI distress, headache, hypertension, and poor nutrition. The medical team spent time educating the patients on proper nutrition, the need to increase water, and non-pharmacological treatment for pain. Education on the importance of dental hygiene (brushing teeth) was provided to children, along with a toothbrush and toothpaste. The most common medications passed were multi-vitamins, ibuprofen, GI medications and a variety of antibiotics.

Overall, this trip was amazing. To be able to touch the lives of so many patients and families is heartwarming. Students were able to practice their skills in the clinic setting, experience a different culture, and work as a cohesive team to provide care to the people of Ecuador. Doctors and nurse practitioners were able to lay their healing hands on patients of all ages, treating problems and providing care. Missionaries were able to connect to people and spread the word of the Lord. Every single person on this Spring Term trip had an experience of a lifetime and left knowing they touched many lives in Ecuador.

NURSES ON BOARDS BY KIMBERLY HARPER

We need your help! In order to improve the health of our Indiana communities and the nation we, as nurses at all levels, need to bring our experience and knowledge to the tables where important decisions about the health of our family, friends and neighbors are being made every day. As leaders in the health outcomes of the communities in which we live, work and play, it is imperative that we each bring our voices to these important discussions.

Have you ever thought about serving your community through joining a community board or accepting a local or governmental appointment? You have much to offer and it might be easier and less time consuming than you think. Nurses find that successful board placement usually lies in nurses selecting boards where there is a strong connection to the values and passion of the individual. For example, if you have young children consider joining the board of your child's baseball or soccer league, if you have a passion for helping people who have cancer consider joining a community board that offers resources for cancer patients, or, if your passion lies with getting legislation passed that will improve some aspect of the health of Hoosiers look into getting appointed to a state or local governmental organization.

Just as nurses are highly skilled at the bedside, in the clinic, in the classroom, etc., nurses also bring a high level of skill to the boardroom. Competencies in areas such as strategic planning, team building, communication, human resources, finance, and many more make nurses sought after to fill seats on many boards and decisionmaking groups across Indiana and the nation. Additionally, nurses who serve in these volunteer roles frequently share that they get more personal satisfaction out of their service to the boards than the time they give.

The national Nurses on Boards Coalition (NOBC) is a collaboration between 29 of the large national nursing organizations (such as ANA, AONE, Sigma, NLN, etc.) who are working together to place more nurses into board seats across the nation. NOBC has created a website that includes several resources to help you prepare and serve as a member of a board or in an appointed position. NOBC also created a database to collect and disseminate the numbers of nurses who currently serve on boards or would like to serve. All these resources can be found at <u>www.nursesonboardscoalition.org</u>. All Indiana nurses are encouraged to register in this database to receive valuable resource tools for preparation and service as well as to let NOBC know about the boards or councils on which you currently serve by registering your board service on the site.

In addition to NOBC at the national level, Indiana has a replicated model of the national organization right here to help you prepare for success in these roles. Indiana NOBC holds quarterly "Get on Board" training sessions across the state and collects and frequently sends out board opportunities to nurses who have registered through the national database indicating their desire to serve. 
